**AID TO THE CHURCH IN NEED**

Aid to the Church in Need (ACN) is Ireland's leading charity for protecting the rights of Christians and supporting the suffering and persecuted Church. Founded in Dublin in 1947, ACN have been dedicated to the service of fellow Christians around the world. ACN have national offices in over 20 countries, which in turn deliver help to fellow Christians in over 140 countries around the world.

Every year Aid to the Church in Need hosts the Week of Witness, a week of campaigning and prayer for persecuted Christians around the world. Red Wednesday is the central event of the Week of Witness. Red Wednesday is a day to gather and draw attention to the plight of those who are persecuted and oppressed for their religious beliefs. Cathedrals, churches and public buildings around the world will light up in red to show solidarity with our brothers and sisters in Christ. *This year, Red Wednesday will take place on the 25 November.*

It is clear that the persecution of Christians is reaching a crisis point. In terms of the number of people involved, the gravity of the acts committed, and their impact, not only are Christians more persecuted than any other faith group, but ever-increasing numbers are experiencing the worst forms of persecution. The purpose of *Red Wednesday* is to join together and raise a strong voice in support of the persecuted who are unable to speak freely, and who look to us - their brothers and sisters in Christ - to speak on their behalf. **Exploring Eucharist - Reflecting on phrases from the Mass.**

*This week we reflect on  
'Glory to God in the highest, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory'*

In praying these words our prayer is offered directly to God. We refer to him as You. When I say 'Glory to God' I am saying that I adore you, you who alone are God. Although we use the word 'adore' loosely- of another person, or a painting, or fine food-there is only one fitting object of our adoration that is You (God).

To glorify God is to express the heart of the relationship between ourselves and God; that I am a creature and God is the creator, that I am searching, and God is my salvation. And when I glorify and adore God, I am most free. I am letting my spirit soar, not asking for anything, nor groveling or cajoling or doing business, but simply proclaiming who You are.
